

Parent/Student Handbook for Academic Year 2018-2019

Dear Parents:

Whether you are a new parishioner or a return parishioner, I am delighted to welcome you (back) to St. Raymond's Religious Education Program (CCD) as we begin a new school year. I am very excited about the coming year, and, along with my staff and volunteers, look forward to doing our very best, with God's grace, to provide your children the most outstanding catechetical program in the Diocese.

I consider it one of my main responsibilities as a spiritual Father to provide the best faith education possible for all my spiritual children, but most especially the youngest. Over the last couple of years I've introduced a lot of changes to our program in pursuit of that goal. 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St. Raymond of Peñafort Catholic Church Religious Education Program

The mission of St. Raymond's Religious Education Program is to teach the truths of the Faith, as taught by the one teacher, Jesus Christ, handed down by the Apostles, and reiterated through the Magisterium of the Catholic Church.

We acknowledge that each child is created in the image and likeness of God and each child's dignity as a unique child of God is to be nurtured and developed. An understanding of Jesus' command to love God with your whole heart, soul, mind and strength and to love your neighbor as yourself is central to our Religious Education program.

We are dedicated to providing the catechists and assistant catechists with the tools necessary to communicate the Faith clearly and accurately. Each class is assigned a catechist and assistant catechist to meet the students' needs. We strive to keep class size at a reasonable level so that teachers are able to convey the Catholic faith to the students in a systematic and orderly manner.

The core elements listed below form the foundation and strength of St. Raymond's Religious Education Program.

- The parents are recognized and respected as the primary educators of their children.
- The Catholic faith is presented in its fullness and entirety as both knowledge to be learned and a life to be lived.
- Our Blessed Mother, as the first disciple of Jesus, is our model.
- The Sacramental life is central to developing and sustaining the Catholic Faith.
- Frequent reception of the Sacraments of Penance and Holy Eucharist for the entire family is encouraged.
- The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass and the Real Presence of our Lord in the Eucharist is the "source and summit" of our Faith.
- The Gospel values as expressed in the Ten Commandments, Beatitudes, Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy are professed, cultivated and practiced.
- The Word of God is revered.
- The virtues are fostered and practiced in everyday life.
- Studying the lives of the saints as examples for our lives is promoted.
- The practice of prayer for growth in the spiritual life is stressed. Family participation in Holy Hours, Rosaries, Novenas, personal prayers, and Mass are stressed and encouraged.

Parents' Role

Parents are the primary religious educators of their children, especially by the example they set. The family is the Domestic Church and the place where a child first experiences the Catholic faith; "catechesis at the dinner table" is a great place to start! The Religious Education program should merely complement, *not replace*, the religious education children receive in the home. The Religious Education Program assists parents in their God-given role as educators of the Faith by:

- Providing weekly religious education classes for children in a classroom setting and spending time in the presence of Our Lord in the Tabernacle in the Church.
- Providing weekly homework assignments on which students and parents should work together. Parents should review homework for completion and accuracy and should sign the completed homework.
- Providing the truth of the Roman Catholic Faith as handed down by Jesus Christ through Sacred Scripture, Sacred Tradition, the Magisterium (teaching authority) of the Church, and the Church Fathers.

Students' Role

Students are expected to be <u>punctual and prepared</u> for class each week. Students should arrive <u>no earlier</u> than 15 minutes prior to the start of class, but should make every effort to <u>be in class five (5) minutes before class begins</u>. If there is no teacher in the classroom upon arrival, student and parent should wait in the hallway until the teacher or assistant arrives. In addition:

- Each week, students should bring their textbooks, writing utensils, and completed homework assignments signed by a parent or guardian.
- \$\frac{1}{2}\$ Students should come ready to learn and to participate in class.
- Students should exhibit Christian behavior at all times.
- Christian love of neighbor demands that every student has the right to learn in a classroom where students are well behaved. Similarly, every catechist and assistant catechist has the right to teach in such an environment. In the event that a student finds it difficult to exhibit proper behavior, the catechist will call upon the Religious Education Office for assistance. Every attempt will be made to integrate the child into the classroom prior to contacting his/her parents.
- From the Office of Child Protection: students are asked to leave their cell phones and all electronic devices at home. If they bring them to class, they will be asked to turn them off and leave them in a container in the classroom and retrieve them at the end of the session.

Dress Code

It is preferred that shorts <u>not</u> be worn to class. <u>If shorts are worn to class, they must be of appropriate length – NO SHORT SHORTS</u>. If shorts are worn, they should be no more than three inches above the knee. Articles of clothing which depict drugs, alcohol, profanity, weapons, and/or sexual innuendo are forbidden. No student should wear excessively baggy pants, or pants with rips. All pants must be worn at the waist. No hats or headbands with accessories extending above/beyond the band are allowed.

No one should wear tight-fitting clothing <u>including leggings</u>, unless leggings are worn under a dress or under a "big shirt" which is at least mid-thigh length. Halter tops, tank tops, midriff shirts, spaghetti straps, or clothing that may be considered <u>immodest dress</u> should not be worn. Boys should not wear tank tops or any other articles of immodest dress.

> A child who is dressed inappropriately according to the standards outlined above will be given a verbal warning. An email will be sent advising the parent/guardian of the violation. If the same child dresses inappropriately a second time, the parent/guardian will be contacted and asked to bring a change of clothing for the child.

Attendance / Early Dismissal / Absence

Because of the different configurations of each parish, the Office of Risk Management has asked that every parish formulate their own policy with regard to dropping off and picking up children for CCD classes. Father De Celles has decided not to change the policy which is already in place, which requires parents to escort their children (Grades K-8) to the classroom and also to pick them up at their classroom when the session has ended.

Your child should be in his/her seat and ready to begin class at the starting time, as we will be going up to the church after class attendance is taken.

Consistent and faithful attendance is vital for understanding the material presented. Please make every effort to get your children to class each week. Please inform the Religious Education Office if your child(ren) will be absent.

<u>IMPORTANT</u>: If a parent or guardian <u>must</u> pick up a child early, <u>he/she must first check in</u> <u>with the Religious Education Office to sign the child out</u>. Someone from the RE office will retrieve the student from class. <u>Please DO NOT go directly to the classroom</u> to pick up your child! This is extremely important for the safety of our children.

If a student in a sacramental year (Grades 2, 7, or 8) misses one-fourth (25%) or more of the scheduled classes, they may be required to retake the coursework for that year in the following year's program.

Please note: three tardy arrivals or early dismissals equal one absence.

Tardiness

Out of Christian charity and respect for the teacher and classmates, **please arrive for class on time**; tardiness can be a serious distraction! If a student arrives after opening prayers have begun in the classroom, please have the child wait outside the classroom until prayer is concluded, then he/she may enter. If a student arrives after their class has gone up to the church, the parent must stay with the child in the Parish Hall until their class returns. Please DO NOT take the student directly to the church as this will only interrupt the meditation time of the students in the church.

Class Cancellations

Please note that Religious Education classes follow Fairfax County School closings <u>for inclement</u> <u>weather</u>.

If classes or after school activities/programs in Fairfax County Schools are cancelled due to inclement weather, the religious education classes at our parish are also cancelled. If Fairfax County schools dismiss early due to inclement weather, religious education classes are cancelled. On bad weather days, if classes have NOT been cancelled, please use your best judgment in bringing your child to class if the roads in your neighborhood seem unsafe.

Learning Disabilities/Health Related Issues

If your child has a learning disability or health related issues that would necessitate special consideration while attending religious education classes, please notify the Religious Education Office in writing by sending a letter, email, or by **entering the information on the registration form**. All information will remain confidential, but may be passed on to the catechist or assistant catechist to assist them in teaching your child.

<u>Textbooks</u>

The textbooks used in our Religious Education Program are the following: "Image of God" series for Kindergarten and the "Faith and Life" series for First through Eighth Grades. Each student will also receive a supplemental "Basic Study Questions" booklet. High School texts include the *Didache* series in Grades 9 and 10 and *Catholicism and Ethics* in Grades 11 and 12.

Testing

Midterm and final exams are given to all Religious Education students in grades 1 through 8 in a multiple-choice, fill in the blank or short answer format. The tests are given to students who attend Religious Education classes and those students who are home-schooled for religious education only. The midterm exams cover the first half of the Basic Study Questions booklet while the final exam covers the second half of the booklet.

Please notify the Religious Education Office if your child has testing accommodations in school. Every effort will be made to meet their special needs in the religious education classroom.

PLEASE NOTE: Parents who homeschool their children in all subjects including Religion, **and have students in Sacramental preparation (Grade 2 and Grades 7-8)** are asked to administer the Religious Education exams to their children or to have them come in and take the test during exam week. These parents may alternatively administer a midterm and final exam using the tests from the particular homeschool program they are using. Please provide the Religious Education Office with the completed and graded test.

Student Evaluations

Catechists will provide a standard written evaluation of a student's progress twice during the school year (January and May). These evaluations will communicate the grade earned on the midterm and final exams and may also contain comments from the Catechist.

Curriculum

The Religious Education Program Curriculum, in accord with the universal Catechism of the Catholic Church, centers on:

- The Creed and Scripture
- The Liturgy and the Seven Sacraments
- Faith and Morals
- Christian Prayer
- The Virtues
- Apologetics (How to defend the Faith)

Prayers and Lists

Each student is expected to master the prayers and lists introduced at the grade level indicated in the chart below, building on the previous year's requirements. The only way a student can master a prayer is through repetition, and the only way to master the required lists is by memorization. The parents are expected to teach these prayers and lists to their children at the indicated grade level. Praying regularly at home will help them to master the required prayers, and memorization drills will help with learning the lists. The children will be evaluated in Religious Education class to measure success in this endeavor.

3	Previous Grade requirements plus Grace Before Meals, Grace After Meals, Seven Sacraments
4	Previous Grade requirements plus Hail Holy Queen, Morning Offering, Three Theological Virtues, Four Cardinal Virtues, Holy Days of Obligation
5	Previous Grade requirements plus The Apostles' Creed, Anima Christi, Twelve Apostles, Mysteries of the Rosary
6	Previous Grade requirements plus Seven Deadly Sins, Beatitudes, Prayer Before a Crucifix
7	Previous Grade requirements plus the Pentateuch, Prayer to the Holy Spirit, Precepts of the Church, Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy
8	Previous Grade requirement plus the Memorare

Why should your children learn these prayers and lists? Because the prayers cited above are a small part of the beautiful treasury of traditional prayers and devotions of our Catholic Faith. The lists above provide the children with a glimpse into the foundations of our Faith, as well as providing a base from which they can learn how to live their Faith.

Each child will be given a Basic Study Questions booklet in which they will find their required prayers and lists cited above.

Dear Religious Education Family,

Welcome to the 2018-19 Religious Education year!

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, Article 12, requires that safe environment training be provided for the children every year. The Diocese of Arlington uses the *Formation in Christian Chastity* Program for Grades 1-8 and *Called to Protect* for Grades 9-12. The program will be presented to your child(ren) in grade 1 and in grades 5-12 during the month of October. It is not a requirement to present the program to grades 2-4.
