Narrative on the mysteries of the kingdom – Mt 11-12

C. Discourse on the Seven Parables – Mt 13 most important – like meat in a sandwich (bread, mustard, meat, mustard, bread) – the parables begin here

Woe to you blind guides Woe to you brood of vipers, you children of hell

#### Matthew 12

- Matthew 12:1-2 "At that time Jesus went through the grain fields on the sabbath;...what is not lawful to do on the sabbath"
  - Matthew tells us that suddenly the Pharisees, who were following Him, popped out of the bushes and accused Him of violating the Sabbath
  - At this point, the Pharisees as a group had decided that Jesus was not the Messiah and looked for opportunities to attack, discredit, and destroy Him
  - They attempted to divide His disciples from Him and divide Him from His disciples

- But, Jesus and His disciples were not doing anything that violated the Law (Torah)
- The Sabbath Laws were designed to keep the day holy and separate
- They prohibited harvesting (using the sickle) to gather grain on the Sabbath
- But, they did not prohibit all activities on the Sabbath
- The Law allowed one to walk along side of a grain field and pluck and eat some grain
- It even prohibited harvesting any grain that was growing outside the boarders of your planting as that grain belonged to the poor and the animals

- So, in this passage Jesus was not doing anything wrong
- But, the Pharisees decided to attack Jesus for a number of things including not keeping the tradition of the elders
- Father said that these traditions were like hedges around the law
- The Pharisees attempted to avoid any type of physical activity on the Sabbath
- So, although the Law did not prohibit carrying a piece of wood on the Sabbath, they attacked a man healed by Jesus for carrying his mat on the Sabbath \*

- Matthew 12: 3-13 "He said to them, 'Have you not read what David did when he was hungry,...whole like the other"
  - By this story Jesus was showing the Pharisees that He was:
    - The new David; the son of David
    - The Lord of the Sabbath
    - Greater than the Sabbath laws
    - 1st Samuel 21:1-9 a \*

- Matthew 12:14-21 "But the Pharisees went out and took counsel against him, how to destroy him...in his name will the Gentiles hope"
  - But, the Pharisees were not buying this, and as mentioned earlier, had decided to destroy Him
  - Father pointed out that not every Pharisee was against Him (Nicodemus, and later Gamaliel) but the movement as a whole were thus inclined
  - Jesus was revealing himself, and Matthew was showing his listeners that He was the Messiah and that the spirit of God was upon Him
  - Further, Jesus directed his listeners not to make him known to fulfil Isaiah's "suffering servant song" (Isaiah 42:1-4) b\*

- Matthew 12:22-32 Then a blind and dumb demoniac was brought to him...either in this age or the age to come
  - The people were amazed and asked if this could be the son of David, the Messiah?
  - When the people saw these things they were asking who but someone sent by God could do them
  - He was doing them by the spirit of God
  - On the other hand, the Pharisees were saying that he was using demonic powers to do them and to deceive the people
  - Jesus pointed out that their argument was completely illogical

- Father said that there were two plans
  - Plan A meant that the people heard the words of Jesus and believed
  - Plan B meant that they would see His works and then believe His words
- The Pharisees offered a third alternative by saying that Jesus was blaspheming, for only God could forgive sins
- But, as we saw earlier, the people believed that God had given this authority (to forgive sins) to men
- This meant that they had attributed the power of Jesus to God

- They acknowledged that the power of the Holy Spirit to forgive sins was in Jesus
- But, the Pharisees were articulating a plan C by saying that these things were done by the power of *Beelzebul* (the devil)
- If true, this would have meant that there was no forgiveness of sin, and the people could not repent, or have a change of heart
- After giving his hearers a basic class on logic, Jesus again attempted to reason with them \*

- Matthew 12:33-35 Either make the tree good and its fruit good... bring forth evil"
  - He reminds them that they can know a tree by its fruits
  - Then he tells them to look at his works and words and then decide if he represents a good or bad tree
  - It is obvious that the Pharisees were calling him a bad tree (doing these wonderful deeds by the power of Beelzebul) \*

- Matthew 12:36-42 "I tell you... greater than Solomon is here"
  - Jesus tell his hearers that it is too late since the day of judgment was already done
  - What kind of saying was Jesus giving them?
  - He told them that the only sign they will see will be his death
  - At this point, Jesus is beginning to draw a line in the sand
  - He has spent three years preaching to them and now they have to make a decision whether or not they will accept his words

- Many were with him, but there was a large number who were still undecided
- Jesus warned them that it was time to make a decision
- After this last warning, he begins to speak in parables
- Father said that a parable was a mystery
- Here in Matthew 12, he told them that the son of man was like the prophet Jonah
- Then He reminded them of the preaching of Jonah caused Nineveh to repent
- Further, He spoke of the Queen of the South who came to see Solomon and then told them that He was greater than Solomon! \*

- Matthew 12:43-45 "When the unclean spirit has gone out of the man,...So shall it be also with this evil generation"
  - Father suggested that perhaps we should not do exorcisms as from this it seems that the situation got worse
  - Jesus said that "this generation" (the one He was talking to) was filled with demons
  - He was trying to cleanse the people of Israel of this curse
  - Again, he was calling his listeners to make a decision

- They could either "walk with Jesus" or remain in Galilee after he departed for Judea
- This meant that if they did not go with him to Jerusalem then the demons He had cast out would return to them
- That generation would be like the possessed man who was seven times worse than before the exorcism \*

- Matthew 12:46-50 "While he was still speaking to the people...my brother and sister, and mother"
  - Father said that it was not about genetics that made His mother or brethren important
  - It was because Mary received the word of God and kept it
  - He was saying that any of the brethren who wanted to become a part of the disciples could do so by hearing and accepting His word
  - Further, by the time of the Book of Acts, the early church accepted the brethren into its community after hearing "the word"
  - This discussion will continue in Matthew 13

#### Matthew 13

- Matthew 13:1-2 "That same day Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the sea...and the whole crowd stood on the beach"
  - At this point, Jesus was staying in Peter's house in Capernaum, on the Sea of Galilee
  - He had been living among the people who came to hear him and/or be healed for possibly the previous three years
  - So here he left Peter's house and sat down on the beach of the Sea of Galilee
  - When it got too crowded, he got into (most likely) Peter's boat
  - Father pointed out that Peter still had his boat but that he was now serving Jesus as a "fisherman"

- Matthew 13:3-9 "And he told them many things in parables... He who has ears, let him hear"
  - Most of the people living in the northern region of Galilee who were not tied to the fishing industry were grain farmers
  - The entire area was covered in beautiful grain-producing land
  - Jesus was mainly talking to farmers
  - Father asked us to imagine Jesus giving this parable to those farmers
  - At that time, grain farmers broadcasted the seed by hand and some of it fell on bad soil and hopefully most of it fell on good soil

- Matthew 13:10-17 "Then the disciples came and said to him... and did not hear it"
  - Father pointed out that the problem here was that the people had been listening to Jesus over this time, but they had not heard what said
  - They had seen his works (10 mighty deeds/miracles in Mt 8 & 9), but had not really seen them
  - If they had heard and seen Him, their hearts would have been converted, and they would have repented so that He could heal them
  - At this point, Jesus begins to speak to them in **parables** which can be seen as signs pointing back to the time of Isaiah (Isaiah 42:19 c)

- Even though some of those who heard his words (his disciples) may not have really understood exactly what He was talking about, they at least had a grasp or hint at what He was saying
- They had faith in what He said and were determined to stick with Him
- Thus, He told them, "to him who has will more be given"
- But, to those who refused to accept His words will have nothing to show for it, and even the little they have will be taken away

- In the next couple of chapters, we will see Jesus begin to walk away from *Galilee* and not return
- Father said that the train was leaving the station and He was asking His listeners whether or not they were going with Him
- Before He left, He gave them several other parables about the Kingdom of Heaven (God)
- Father explained that the parables were cryptic sayings that were hard to understand (unless you had the code to unlock them)
- If one had the code, they were beautiful teaching vehicles

- Matthew was saying that those who were not "in the house" with Jesus, were not given the code (making the parables obscure stories)
- Matthew provided six other parables to include: the parable of the seeds and weeds in Matthew 13:24
- Father pointed out that this parable gives consolation throughout the history of the church to explain how wickedness can exit side by side with righteousness within the church
- In this parable, Jesus directed that both the good and bad seed be allowed to grow up together and then be sorted out at the harvest
- Jesus gave us many parables like this
- Again, the disciples came to him "in the house" where He explained their meaning to the disciples (those in the house)

- Matthew 13:53-58 "And when Jesus had finished these parables...because of their unbelief"
  - This marks the end of Book 3 of Matthew's Gospel
  - At this point, Jesus was in the synagogue in his home town of Nazareth
  - His neighbors could not believe that this carpenter could really be the long-awaited Messiah
  - Jesus reminded them that a prophet was not accepted in his home town
  - We will now turn to Matthew 14
