

Parent Handbook for Academic Year 2021-2022

Dear Parents:

Whether you are a new parishioner or a return parishioner, I am delighted to welcome you (back) to St. Raymond's Religious Education Program (CCD) as we begin a new school year. Last year was a very challenging year for the CCD program, as it was for everyone. So I am looking forward to getting things back to as "normal" as possible in the coming year, and along with my staff and volunteers, look forward to doing our very best, with God's grace, to continue to provide your children the most outstanding catechetical program in the Diocese.

I consider it one of my main responsibilities as a spiritual Father to provide the best faith education possible for all my spiritual children, but most especially the youngest. 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St. Raymond of Peñafort Catholic Church Religious Education Program

The mission of St. Raymond's Religious Education Program is to teach the truths of the Faith, as taught by the one teacher, Jesus Christ, handed down by the Apostles, and reiterated through the Magisterium of the Catholic Church. An understanding of Jesus' command to love God with your whole heart, soul, mind and strength and to love your neighbor as yourself is central to our Religious Education program.

We are dedicated to providing the catechists and assistant catechists with the tools necessary to communicate the Faith clearly and accurately. Our goal is to have a catechist and assistant catechist in each classroom to meet the students' needs. We strive to keep class size at a reasonable level so that teachers are able to convey the Catholic faith to the students in a systematic and orderly manner.

The core elements listed below form the foundation and strength of St. Raymond's Religious Education Program.

- Jesus Christ is recognized as the one true Teacher.
- The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass and the Real Presence of our Lord in the Eucharist are the "source and summit" of our Faith.
- The Word of God is revered and incorporated into the weekly lessons.
- Our Blessed Mother, as the first disciple of Jesus, is our model.
- The parents are recognized and respected as the primary educators of their children.
- The Catholic faith is presented in its fullness and entirety as both knowledge to be learned and a life to be lived.
- The Sacramental life is central to developing and sustaining the Catholic faith.
- Frequent reception of the Sacraments of Penance and Holy Eucharist for the entire family is encouraged.
- The Gospel values as expressed in the Ten Commandments, Beatitudes, Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy are professed, cultivated and practiced.
- The virtues are fostered and practiced in everyday life.
- Studying the lives of the saints as examples for our own lives is promoted.
- The practice of prayer for growth in the spiritual life is stressed. Family participation in Holy Hours, Rosaries, Novenas, personal prayers, and Mass attendance are promoted and encouraged.
- We acknowledge that each child is created in the image and likeness of God, created as male or female, and each child's dignity as a unique child of God is to be nurtured and developed.

Parents' Role

Parents are the primary religious educators of their children, especially by the example they set. The family is the *Domestic Church* and the place where a child first experiences the Catholic faith; it's hard to beat "catechesis at the dinner table!" Parents are asked to work with their child in completing the homework assigned by the Religious Education teacher.
 Parents should review that homework for completion and accuracy and should sign the completed homework.

The Religious Education program should merely complement, *not replace*, the religious education children receive in the home. The Religious Education program assists parents in their God-given role as educators of the Faith by:

- Providing weekly religious education classes for children in a classroom setting and spending time in the presence of Our Lord in the Tabernacle in the Church.
- Providing weekly homework assignments on which students and parents should work together.
- Providing the truth of the Roman Catholic Faith as handed down by Jesus Christ through Sacred Scripture, Sacred Tradition, the Magisterium (teaching authority) of the Church, and the Church Fathers.

Students' Role

All classes begin in the church with "Holy Ten Minutes" of prayer. Students should arrive <u>no earlier</u> than 15 minutes before class is scheduled to begin, but should make every effort to <u>be seated in the church five (5) minutes prior to class start time</u>. Students are expected to be <u>punctual and prepared</u> for class each week. In addition:

- Each week, students should bring their textbooks, <u>writing utensils</u>, and <u>completed homework</u> <u>assignments signed by a parent or guardian</u>.
- Students should come ready to learn and to participate in class.
- Students should exhibit Christian behavior at all times.
- Christian love of neighbor demands that every student has the right to learn in a classroom
 where students are well behaved. Similarly, every catechist and assistant catechist has the
 right to teach in such an environment. In the event a student finds it difficult to exhibit proper
 behavior, the catechist will call upon the Religious Education Office for assistance. Every
 attempt will be made to integrate the child into the classroom prior to contacting his/her
 parents.
- <u>From the Office of Child Protection</u>: students are asked to **leave cell phones and all electronic devices at home**. If they bring them to class, they will be asked to turn them off and leave them in a container in the classroom and retrieve them at the end of the session.

Dress Code

It is preferred that shorts <u>not</u> be worn to class. <u>If shorts are worn to class, they must be of appropriate length – **NO SHORT SHORTS**</u>. If shorts are worn, they should be no more than three inches above the knee. Articles of clothing which depict drugs, alcohol, profanity, weapons, and/or sexual innuendo are forbidden. No student should wear excessively baggy pants, or pants with rips. All pants must be worn at the waist. **No hats or headbands with accessories extending above/beyond the band are allowed.**

No one should wear tight-fitting clothing <u>including leggings</u>, unless leggings are worn under a dress or under a "big shirt"/ tunic which is at least mid-thigh length. Halter tops, tank tops, midriff shirts, spaghetti straps, or clothing that may be considered <u>immodest dress</u> should not be worn. Boys should not wear tank tops or any other articles of immodest dress.

> A child who is dressed inappropriately according to the standards outlined above will be given a verbal warning. An email will be sent advising the parent/guardian of the warning given to the child. If the same child dresses inappropriately a second time, the parent/guardian will be contacted and asked to bring a change of clothing for the child.

<u>Attendance / Early Dismissal / Absence</u>

<u>Parents should drop their children off at the front of the church</u> and then pick them up in the Parish Hall when the session has ended.

Consistent and faithful attendance is vital for understanding the material presented. Please make every effort to get your children to class each week. <u>Please inform the Religious</u> Education Office if your child(ren) will be absent.

<u>IMPORTANT</u>: If a parent or guardian <u>must</u> pick up a child early, <u>he/she must first check in</u> <u>with the Religious Education Office to sign the child out</u>. Someone from the RE office will retrieve the student from class. <u>Please DO NOT go directly to the classroom</u> to pick up your child! This is extremely important for the safety of our children.

If a student in a sacramental preparation year (Grades 2, 7, and 8) misses one-fourth (25%) or more of the scheduled classes, they may be required to retake the coursework for that year in the following year's program.

Please note: three tardy arrivals or early dismissals equal one absence.

Tardiness

Out of Christian charity and respect for the teacher and classmates, <u>please arrive on time</u>; tardiness can be a serious distraction – especially in the church when everyone is praying! If a student arrives after opening prayers have begun in the church, the child will wait in the Narthex with the Religious Education Assistant or a volunteer.

Class Cancellations

<u>Please note</u> that the parish is no longer following Fairfax County Schools' weather cancellation policies.

If there is a question as to whether Religious Education (CCD) classes are cancelled due to inclement weather, please check your email inbox or the parish website: www.straymonds.org for cancellation information.

Learning Disabilities/Health Related Issues

If your child has a learning disability or health related issues that would necessitate special consideration while attending religious education classes, please notify the Religious Education Office in writing by sending a letter, email, and/or by **entering the information on the registration form**. All information will remain confidential, but may be passed on to the catechist or assistant catechist to assist them in teaching your child.

Textbooks

The textbooks used in our Religious Education Program are the following: "Image of God" series for Kindergarten and the "Faith and Life" series for First through Eighth Grade. Each student will also receive a supplemental "Basic Study Questions" booklet. High School texts include the *Didache* series in Grades 9 and 10 and *Catholicism and Reason* in Grades 11 and 12.

Testing

Midterm and final exams are given to all Religious Education students in grades 1 through 8 in a multiple-choice, fill in the blank or short answer format. The tests are given to students who attend Religious Education classes and those students who are homeschooled for religious education only. The exam questions will come from textbook material covered in class as well as from the Basic Study Questions booklet.

<u>Please note</u>: students in grades 2, 7 and 8 are required to pass both the midterm and final exams with a minimum score of 70%.

Please notify the Religious Education Office if your child has testing accommodations in school. Every effort will be made to meet their special needs in the religious education classroom.

<u>PLEASE NOTE:</u> Parents who homeschool their children in all subjects including Religion, and have students in Sacramental preparation grades (2, 7 and 8) are asked to come in and take the test during exam week. If this is not possible, parents should contact the RE office to make other arrangements.

Student Evaluations

Catechists will provide a standard evaluation of a student's progress twice during the school year (January and May). The student will be evaluated on understanding content, participation in class, homework completion and behavior. The report will include midterm and final exam grades and may also contain comments from the Catechist.

Curriculum

The Religious Education Program Curriculum, in accord with the universal Catechism of the Catholic Church, centers on:

- The Creed and Scripture
- The Liturgy and the Seven Sacraments
- Faith and Morals
- Christian Prayer
- The Virtues
- Apologetics (how to defend the Faith)

Prayers and Lists

Each student is expected to memorize the prayers and lists found in the Basic Study Questions (BSQ) booklet for their grade level, building on the previous year's requirements. Please work with your child to learn these prayers and lists. The best way to help your child master a prayer is through praying regularly at home, and the best way to master the required lists is by memorization.

Why should your children learn these prayers and lists? Because the prayers found in the BSQ booklet are a small part of the beautiful treasury of traditional prayers and devotions of our Catholic Faith. The lists provide the children with a glimpse into the foundations of our Faith, as well as providing a base from which they will learn how to live their Catholic faith.

The children will be evaluated in Religious Education class to measure success in this endeavor.

Safe Environment Education

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, Article 12, requires that safe environment education and training be conducted for minors. The Diocese of Arlington requires the training to take place every year.

St. Raymond Religious Education program uses *Formation in Christian Chastity* for Grades 1-8 and *Called to Protect* for Grades 9-12 to meet this requirement.

The appropriate program will be presented to students in Grade 1 and in Grades 5-12 during the month of October. It is not a requirement to present the program to grades 2-4. The Director of Religious Education or the RE Secretary/Parish Vitus Liaison will be presenting the material to each class.
